#### FOLGER SHAKESPEARE LIBRARY VISITS THE HOUSE OF THE TEMPLE LIBRARY

NMAY 9, 2012, seven colleagues from the Folger Shakespeare Library came to visit the Library of the Supreme Council and to tour the building. I had our most impressive books, an original poem written by Robert Burns, and an old patent displayed on the reading room conference table. We also included a book entitled, *Shakespeare a Freemason*. Shakespeare, was not a Freemason, but this book shows ways he might have been, by words he used in his writings. We ended with refreshments and pastries served in the Robert Burns Library.

Carrie Smith, Rare Book Cataloger for the NEHfunded Shakespeare Collection project, said of their time at the Supreme Council, "On behalf of our



group, thank you very much for your hospitality and for the wonderful tour of the library and of the Temple. It is a fascinating building and collection, and I know that I speak for all of us in saying that we enjoyed ourselves immensely... and learned so much in the process."

#### PARTNERING WITH OAK KNOLL PRESS

AK KNOLL PRESS, who has co-published all of our bibliographies to date, now has offered us a way of promoting the *American Masonic Periodicals*, *Burnsiana*, and *Lincolniana* bibliographies through the web database Rarebooks.info. This will serve as an additional source of revenue for our Library, as all fees and royalties received will be split 50/50 between Oak Knoll Press and the Supreme Council Library. Subscribers to Rarebooks.info gain instant access to full digital and searchable facsimiles of all electronic bibliographies. Oak Knoll, who is handling the preparation, sees this as an exciting marketing opportunity, as it will make these titles available to a larger audience. This contract will last two years as we test the waters.

ACH ISSUE OF *Amicus Librarium* will feature a "Rare Book Vault" section highlighting one of our precious books. We hope to bring attention to the vast collection that is housed in the Supreme Council Library. Although our main focus for the Library is Freemasonry, we keep rare treasures like this Theodoro de Bry volume. Last time I checked for a valuation of this book, I found it on Bookfinder.com for approximately \$76,000. Interestingly enough, it is no longer available there.



**DE BRY, THEODORO.** Brevis narratio eorvm qvæ in Florida Americæ provicia Gallis acciderunt, secunda in illam nauigatione, duce Renato de Laudōniere classis Præfecto : anno MDLXIIII (Translation: A brief history of those things which befell the French in the American Province of Florida, during their second voyage, under the leadership of René de Laudōniere, Admiral of the fleet), 1591.

Theodoro de Bry (1528 – 27 March 1598) created a large number of engraved illustrations for his books. Most of his books were based on first-hand observations by explorers. The book mentioned above is in Latin, and it is about travels through Florida.
